## **Journal Writing**

We have continued the students' journal writing into Term 4. Topics covered include introducing themselves, dreams, important people in students' lives, and favourite activities, places, books and music. An important part of any written work is the ability to edit and proofread their own work, checking for any mistakes and clearly expressing

their thoughts and ideas. These skills are transferred to PACE work and literacy class and there is no doubt students' abilities in this area have improved immensely.

### **Writing Workshop**

This term Captain Elana Connor from SY Windfola, a professional writer, ran a writing workshop for all our students. After a discussion of students' previous learning in the use of language and ways of making stories "come alive" Elana had students demonstrate their abilities by writing a story on an interaction they had with an animal. It was a fun lesson and all students participated, practicing and showcasing their skills in story writing then sharing their stories with the rest of the class. It was exciting to see James and Henry use their knowledge of letters and sounds to write a story and read aloud their work.






